Book Review - By: Ethan Hildebrandt


Have you ever read a book that you can't put down? Well, SILVER is one of those books. So, while it is quite a long read, I would highly suggest you invest time into reading this book. It is a regular day at Mortingham Academy, a boarding school for teens, when some of the younger teenagers notice silver colored beetles at the pond. They seem friendly, until they start biting the kids. A few hours later, and the kids are turning into silver zombie-like creatures as well, similar to the beetles. Before the day is over, the students are fighting for their lives against these monstrosities. Some will survive, some won't, and for others, it will be much worse, in Silver, a horror novel by Chris Wooding.

I found this book last year looking for an interesting book to read in Mrs. Marriott's library and came across Silver. Since then, I have read two times.

I would recommend this book to anyone that is up to reading a decent sized book (well over 300 pages and small font) and like horror genre books. It is considered a mature read and certainly not for everyone. While personally I don't find this book scary, it is still one of my favorite books of all time. Chris Wooding has written over 30 books and writes in many different genres, including fantasy, science fiction, horror, steampunk and action.
